



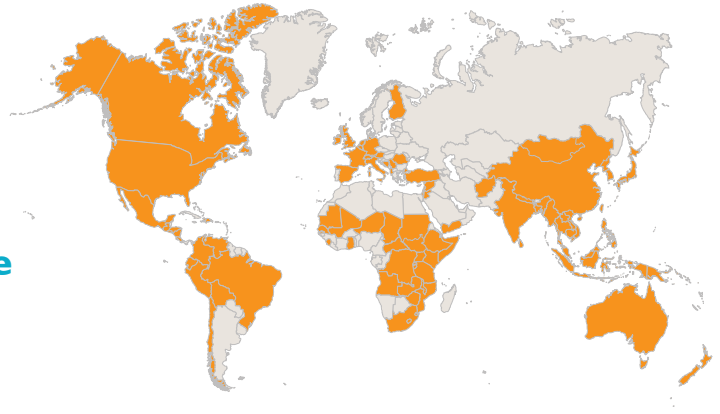

Key Concerns



We urge the world to stand together with the most vulnerable children to fight COVID-19, especially refugees and the internally displaced.



Devastating aftershocks of the crisis are putting at least 30 million children's lives at risk with 85 million more children likely to experience violence. We urgently need to address both the direct health impacts of the virus and the secondary shocks brought about by viral containment measures.



Joining hands with faith leaders is critical to strengthen preparedness, behaviour change and protecting children.

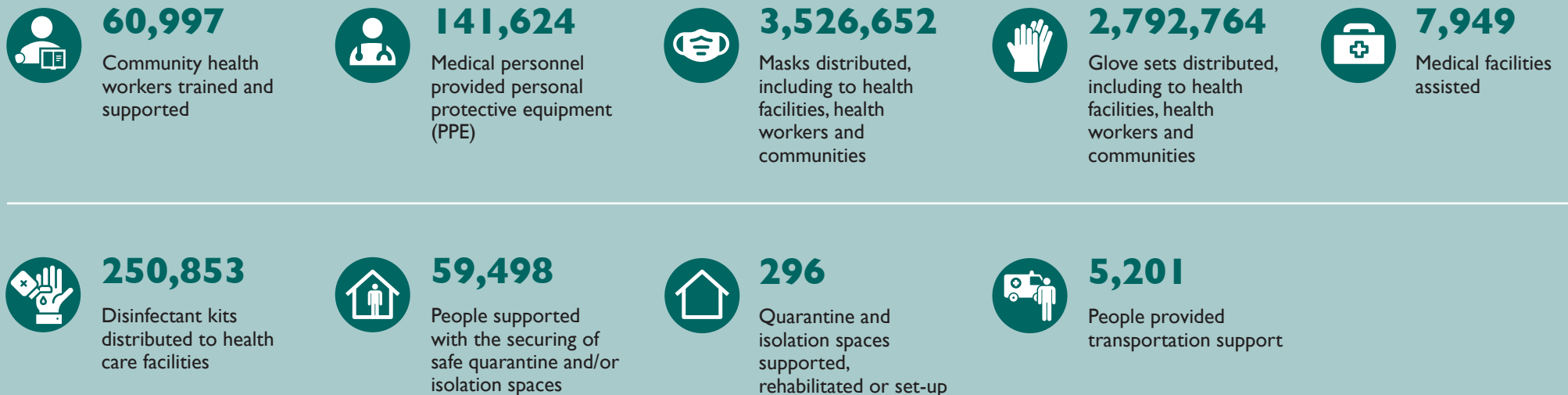

External engagements where World Vision is advocating on priorities, including ending violence against children in the context of COVID-19

- WorldVision partnered with UNICEF, UNHCR, WHO, IOM, and civil society organisations to present at two events during the largest UN led humanitarian event of the year, UN ECOSOC Humanitarian Affairs Segment (HAS), covering protection of children during COVID-19; and Mental Health & Psychosocial Support for Displaced & Migrant Populations during the COVID-19 Pandemic. The events will take place the week of 8-12 June.
- WorldVision contributed to global guidance “Increasing Links Between Humanitarian Cash And Social Protection For An Effective Response To The Covid-19 Pandemic” that was developed in partnership with UN agencies, including OCHA, UNCHR, UNICEF, WFP; NGOs and several Government aid agencies, including GIZ, DFID and SIDA. This guidance will help to address gaps in national government-led social protection transfers in response to COVID-19.
- In alliance with civil society partners in Ecuador, WorldVision organised four Facebook Live events, attended by 14,000 participants, to discuss how to strengthen child protection during COVID-19.
- In Eswatini, World Vision reached a Memorandum of Understanding with the Royal Eswatini to jointly strengthen services for child and adult survivors of gender based violence during COVID-19
- In Bosnia and Herzegovina, WorldVision’s engagement with the Government resulted in a total ban of a federal policy on age-based COVID-19 lockdowns, bringing the policy in alignment with the national constitution and the European Convention, and positively impacting the rights of 457,789 children.
- In the Democratic Republic of Congo, communities shared feedback about their children who used to benefit from school feeding but are now going hungry as a result of school closures. WorldVision and WFP listened and reached a consensus to provide food rations to families of 18,651 children in the Kasai region, who had already been registered and were benefitting from the programme before schools closed.
