FACTS

- 200,000 heads of livestock are lost every year due to dzud.
- 1000-5000 earthquakes are recorded annually, with 3-5 magnitude 5 quakes.
- 6,000–28,000 more people will be exposed to extreme floods by 2035–2044

World Vision International-Mongolia's goal is to achieve sustained impact on the well-being of 500,000 children in Mongolia, including 140,000 most vulnerable children.

KEY INTERVENTIONS

Community-based disaster risk management

Involve children, youth, women, people with disabilities and government authorities in assessing and reducing disaster risks and thus increasing community resilience

Promote risk-informed prevention, mitigation, reparedness, recovery, and rehabilitation to accelerate progress in implementing the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction

Results in Financial Year 2021

- 28,134 community people, including caregivers and children, received preparedness training.
- 114 kindergartens and schools were trained in disaster assessment.
- 74 communities updated their disaster management plan.
- 1,573 herders attended capacity building sessions on farmer-managed natural regeneration.

Participatory disease surveillance

Combine local veterinary knowledge with conventional methods to improve the understanding of disease situations and to detect and contain infectious diseases among animals

Results in Financial Year 2022

23 community members were prepared as participatory disease surveillance practitioners

Livestock emergency guidelines and standards

Provide rapid assistance, protect livestock assets, and rebuild livestock assets of crisis-affected communities, using standards, key actions and guidance based on good practices

Results in Financial Year 2022

100 community people have become trainers on livestock emergency guidelines and standards and have retrained 300 other community people.



Disaster resilience community

Strengthen humanitarian emergency response policies and plans to enhance effectiveness and accountability mechanism and to localize disaster risk reduction-related policies

- Reach: 32,400 community people in 6 target location

Flood Resilience in Ulaanbaatar Ger Area

Enhance the climate change resilience of the seven most vulnerable Ger communities in Ulaanbaatar City

- Donor: Fund for Climate Change and Adaptation
- > Budget: USD 4.5M
- > Timeline: 2019-2022
- Reach: 89,970 community people residing in the target Ger communities that are highly exposed to climate hazards ranging from wind and dust storms to air pollution and floods
