

World Vision Afghanistan's Last 6 Months





Advocacy

- 189 female staff received staff care counselling sessions to overcome the stress they faced as the result of recent restrictions on women.
- 4 female staff shared their feelings, concerns and asks with World Vision Internatinal President and CEO, Andrew Morley, through an online session.
- World Vision Afghanistan National Director, Asuntha Charles, visited some Support Offices and participated in some forums, such as European Humanitarian Forum, where she advocated for children's rights, particularly of girl children, and demanded the global community to stand with Afghan children.
