

Ukraine Crisis Response | April 2025 Fact Sheet

World Vision Presence*

In Ukraine, an 11-year conflict that started in the east of the country in 2014 reached to dramatic escalation of the war since the Russian Federation's 24 February 2022 invasion. It has caused the world's fastest growing displacement crisis since World War II, leaving at least:

- **35.8 million** Population living in Ukraine – **82%** of total Ukrainian population before the conflict (**43.5 million**).
- **12.7 million** People in need of humanitarian assistance in Ukraine – **35.7%** of Population living in Ukraine.
- **6.9 million** Refugees from Ukraine recorded across globally – **16%** of total Ukrainian population before the conflict (**43.5 million**).
- **3.7 million** Internally displaced people – **10%** of Population living in Ukraine.
- **4.2 million** Returnees – **10%** of total Ukrainian population before the conflict.

World Vision started working in Ukraine in March 2022 through 6 and now 3 active offices in Chernivtsi, Kyiv, Dnipro, which currently support aid efforts reaching conflict-affected people in 22 oblasts across Ukraine.

Ukraine Crisis Response Goal

The Ukrainian children, refugees and IDPs, as well as the host communities in Ukraine, Moldova, Romania, and Georgia have the support to overcome the humanitarian consequences of the war crisis.

UCR Strategic Objectives

- 1 Early recovery and economic development opportunities are created for IDP and refugee households, as well as host communities for improved and self-reliant livelihood.
- 2 Children, their families and communities benefit from enhanced social protection mechanisms and education opportunities in Ukraine and host countries.
- 3 Basic needs of vulnerable children, families and communities affected by the war are met in Ukraine and host countries.
- 4 Equitable and complementary partnerships with national and local actors are encouraged and promoted to enable them take stronger leadership role in delivering the humanitarian response and managing the transition to rehabilitation and development.

In Ukraine, VisionFund started the medium- to long-term recovery and development via financing small and medium-sized businesses for further growth, opportunities to generate income and create new jobs. It is aimed to open new opportunities to strengthen and grow communities.

WV UCR Phase 1 Strategy 2022-2024 delivered an inclusive, need driven humanitarian assistance to refugees, IDPs, and the most vulnerable children and their families in Ukraine, Romania, Moldova, and Georgia.


WV UCR Phase 2 Strategy 2024-2026 continues the main Phase 1 directions by integrating humanitarian responses with early recovery and economic development interventions in joint programming with VisionFund, WV's microfinance subsidiary. WV UCR will continue operating in four countries: 70% in Ukraine, 20% in Moldova, 10% in Georgia and Romania.



World Vision UCR:

- April 2025 reporting period in a glance:
 - ✓ children reached accounted for **22%** of the overall people reached;
 - ✓ **7,038** people reached across UCR, which accounts to **0.3%** of the overall people reached to date;
 - ✓ Ukraine – **1,994** (49% of which are children);
 - ✓ Moldova – **4,423** (15% are children);
 - ✓ Romania – **294** (46% are children);
 - ✓ Georgia – **327** (31% are children).
